“Apita o arbitro, abrem-se as cortinas e começa o espetáculo”. Era desta maneira, bastante poética, que o saudoso narrador Fiori Gilioti iniciava a narração radiofônica de uma partida de futebol. Pois foi com lentes de lirismo e de épica que os alunos do Year 7 visitaram na sexta-feira, 13 de março, o recém-inaugurado Museu do Futebol, em São Paulo.

Localizado no Estádio do Pacaembu, entre colunas e fundações, sob a arquibancada do estádio – “como um sítio arqueológico em busca da alma profunda do Brasil” – o

museu mostrou aos alunos, de forma agradável e contagiante, a epopéia do país que se uniu em torno de uma bola. O passeio ao museu, que tem 15 salas divididas em dois andares, ofereceu ao Year 7 a oportunidade de enxergar o esporte mais popular do mundo através de informações que traçam um painel de hábitos, comportamentos e fatos da história do futebol no Brasil. Tendo feito uma longa pesquisa preparatória para a visita, o Year 7 se deleitou e interagiu nas diversas salas que viram.

No final da visita, assistiram a um vídeo em 3D, feito especialmente para o Museu do Futebol, no qual o jogador Ronaldinho Gaúcho dança um verdadeiro balé com a bola nos pés, mostrando toda a ginga e habilidade que fizeram dele o melhor jogador do mundo por 2 anos e um dos melhores de todos os tempos. E a turma ainda pôde cobrar um pênalti, com um goleiro virtual para defender, e ver registrada a velocidade de seu chute. Alguns alunos e algumas alunas mostraram que a St. Nicholas possui vários talentos neste quesito.

O passeio serviu para ajudar aos alunos a entenderem, através do futebol, um pouco da alma e da cultura do Brasil. Quem ainda não viu, fica aqui a dica de mais um agradável museu em São Paulo.

The year 12s did an incredible coke and mentos presentation during their lunchtime.

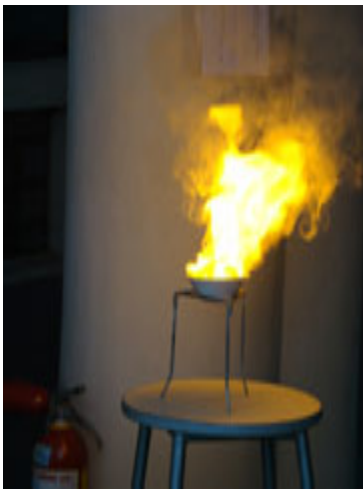
There were a variety of quizzes around school and many students participated showing good scientific knowledge.

Commemorations, Celebrations And Fun Events Around The World

MARCH

1st – St. David's Day is National Day for Welsh people, and is celebrated with storytelling, singing and banquets.

3rd – Hina Matsuri or Doll Festival or Girl's Festival is a Japanese festival. Families wish their daughters success and happiness, and dolls are displayed in the house together with peach blossoms. On Hina Matsuri, sweet sake is drunk and chirashi sushi is eaten.

4th – World Maths Day brings together all mathematics around the world to participate in Maths competitions online during a 48-hour period. It aims to raise everyone's interest for Maths in a fun and interesting way.

8th – International Women's Day is observed around the world to celebrate the economic, political and social achievements of women.

17th – St. Patrick's Day is celebrated by the Irish world over using shamrocks and the colour green. Shamrocks are used because they symbolize the Christian idea of the Holy Trinity: God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

20th – World Storytelling Day is an international celebration of the art of storytelling usually during the spring equinox in the northern hemisphere or the first day of autumn equinox in the southern. On this day, as many people as possible tell and listen to stories in as many languages and at as many places as

possible, during the same day and night.

21st – South Africa observes Human Rights Day on this day in remembrance of a human rights event in Sharpeville, South Africa. The rest of the world however celebrates Human Rights Day on 10th of December. This is also the United Nations International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination. UNESCO World Poetry Day aims to promote the reading, writing, publishing and teaching of poetry throughout the world.

World Down Syndrome Day On this day, Down syndrome organizations throughout the world organize and participate in events to raise public awareness of Down syndrome.

20th-21st – Daylight and nighttime hours are exactly equal. This is called the Spring Equinox. Ancient people used to celebrate the new year during this time, and many still do.

22nd – World Water Day is a time to promote clean water and sustainable aquatic habitats, and to raise public awareness on the current critical water issues.

Full moon in March – Connected with the Spring Equinox, Holi is an ancient Indian festival celebrating the harvest of winter grain, and also marking the end of winter. Holi is a popular spring festival also called the Festival of Colours. People spend the day throwing coloured powder and water at each other.
